Course Details



Concussion for Students

Concussion for Students, developed in Partnership with the Barrow Neurological Institute, has been designed specifically for students to inform them on how to identify, react to, and prevent concussions. This free course is presented as a social media conversation, showing how four different students learn about concussion in different ways. It includes high school students and medical professionals discussing concussion. The key goal is for students to be able to identify signs and symptoms of a concussion so that they can get immediate help before any further injury can occur.



DIAA Concussion Protocol

- 1- Shows Signs or Symptoms = a-Remove from play - Official or Coach b- Evaluated by a Qualified Healthcare Professional [QHCP]
- 2- Qualified Healthcare Professional [QHCP] = MD, DO, School Nurse, Nurse Practitioner, Physician's Assistant or Athletic Trainer [ATC]

3- IF CLEARED BY QHCP THEY MAY RETURN TO PLAY





DIAA Concussion Protocol

- 4- If <u>NOT cleared by QHCP</u> <u>CANNOT RETURN ON THE SAME DAY</u> Then they must have "<u>Written Clearance from a QUALIFIED Physician</u> to return to practice or play.
- 5- Failure to comply = INELIGIBLE athlete
- 6- Parents and Athletes must read and sign PPE Concussion information sheet
- 7- ALL Coaches and Officials must take the NFHS Concussion Education Course

Suggested Guidelines for Management of Concussion in Sports

A concussion is a traumatic brain injury that interferes with normal brain function. An athlete does not have to have suffered a direct blow to the head or lose consciousness (be "knocked out") to have suffered a concussion.

Common Signs and Symptoms of Concussion Include:

- Appears dazed or stunned
- · Is confused about assignment or position
- Forgets an instruction
- · Is unsure of game, score or opponent
- Moves clumsily
- Answers questions slowly
- Loses consciousness (even briefly)
- Shows mood, behavior or personality changes
- · Can't recall events prior to hit or fall
- · Can't recall events after hit or fall

Headaches or "pressure" in head Nausea or vomiting

- Balance problems or dizziness
- Double or blurry vision
- Sensitivity to light
- Sensitivity to noise
- Feeling sluggish, hazy, foggy or groggy
- Concentration or memory problems
- Confusion
 - · Does not "feel right" or is "feeling down"

Suggested Concussion Management:

- 1. No athlete should return to play (RTP) or practice on the same day of a concussion.
- Any athlete suspected of having a concussion should be evaluated by an appropriate health-care professional that day.
- Any athlete with a concussion should be medically cleared by an appropriate health-care professional prior to resuming participation in any practice or competition.
- After medical clearance, RTP should follow a step-wise protocol with provisions for delayed RTP based upon return of any signs or symptoms at rest, while doing school work or with physical activity.



- DIAA provides annual SCA awareness for Coaches.
- DIAA has SCA information on our website.

-ALL Coaches must hold valid CPR certification.



Emergency Action Plan [EAP]

Coaches/A.D.

-Have an ACTION PLAN and PRACTICE it

- 1. Call 911
- 2. Start chest compressions [CPR]
- 3. Get an Automated External Defibrillator (AED)
- 4. Turn it on and follow the voice prompts

Practice Policies

DIAA Regulation 1008/1009-4.2



These are in effect for <u>ALL</u> practice days

(school day and non-school day):

-One day of no activity per seven day period

-A minimum of 21 calendar days of practice

prior to the first competition date [9-9-16]

-Student must practice at least 7 calendar days



prior to participating in a contest

- School day practices limited to two [2] hours

Practice Policies

- DIAA Regulation 1008/1009-4.2 [Practices]
- These are in effect for <u>NON-SCHOOL</u> days



- -A limit of no more than 2 practices with physical activity
- -No practice can be longer than THREE (3) hours in length
- -A Grand Total of FIVE (5) hours of physical activity daily
- -When having 2 practice session in a day;
 - there MUST be a **<u>one hour minimum</u>** cooling period



- between the two practice sessions
- <u>Heat Index requirement must be adhered to**</u>



Adoptions/Modifications of NFHS Rules


Each state association may, in keeping with applicable laws, may authorize exceptions to NFHS playing rules to provide reasonable accommodations to individual participants with disabilities and/or special needs, as well as those individuals with unique and extenuating circumstances. The accommodations should not fundamentally alter the sport, heighten risk to the athlete or others or place opponents at a disadvantage. The school must request a review of the proposed rule accommodation by contacting the DIAA office or that sport's rules interpreter. DIAA will rule on the legality of the accommodation, if approved the school needs to keep the approval letter on file and the Coach needs to take a copy of the approval letter with them to EVERY contest and surrender a copy of



the letter to the Game Officials.





TOURNAMENT FIELD

- > The conference champion MUST possess an overall record of .500 or better to earn the guaranteed berth.
- > The conference champion MUST be in the top 50% of the eligible teams in the state to earn the guaranteed berth.

NOTE: If a conference champion does not satisfy these requirements, the champion will be eligible for an At-Large berth. EMIND

Play a minimum of 12 varsity games to be eligible

 Your opponents must play a minimum of 12 varsity games in order for you to count the game in your statistics

SCHEDULING CRITERIA

- Your "TEAM INDEX" / PERCENTAGE will be based on the number of games on your schedule as of the first allowable date of competition. (2016 = September 09)
- If a game is scheduled for the last day of competition (2016 = November 3) is canceled due to weather related, unplayable conditions and/or conditions beyond the school's control, the team's percentage will be based on one less game.
- In these circumstances, the Chair must be notified for verification. (Chair: Sharyn Wingate @ 302-369-5898)

SCHEDULING CRITERIA – SPECIAL CIRCUMSTANCES

Any special circumstances that may arise during the season that will affect the scheduling criteria requirements, requires approval of the Chairperson of the Committee and the Executive Director of DIAA.

TOURNAMENT SITES

 First & Second round games will be hosted by the higher seeded team. If their field is unsuitable or weather conditions have made their field unplayable, the Committee will choose an alternate site.



TOURNAMENT SITES

 NOTE: If the HOST team's field is unsuitable, the school may contact the Chair to recommend an alternate field as the HOST site. The higher-seeded school will be responsible for game administration at the alternate site.

The Chair and Committee will make the final decision on sites.



THE SEMI-FINAL AND FINAL GAMES WILL BE PLAYED AT **TURF SITES AS** DETERMINED BY THE TOURNAMENT COMMITTEE

GOALKEEPER EQUIPMENT RULE 1-8-1A




 Goalkeeper uniform tops may be multiple colors to ensure contrasting uniforms with field players.

 Effective 2017, the goalkeeper's uniform top must have visible numbers on the front and back. This will create consistency with all uniforms worn on the field.







 The implementation of the new "Long Hit Procedure" created a new name that is consistent with the new procedure.



Rule Change

PENALTY CORNER – REGULATION OR EXTENDED PLAY RULE 10-3-2


- The rule change for 2015 (dealing with restarts for extended play penalty corners) eliminated the clear definitions for when a penalty corner, during regular play, is considered to be completed. The exception to the rule added in 2015 (dealing with restarts for extended play penalty corners) should apply to an injury during regulation play as well as extended play.

The numbers shall be of a solid color contrasting to any surrounding colors. Numbers on the front shall be 3 to 6 inches in height, and 6 to 8 inches in height on the back. Any number from 00 through 99 is legal. A team may not use both numbers 0 and 00. Three-digit numbers and duplicate numbers on players of the same team are **not permitted**. The following are the color requirements for the jersey/top: I. The style/design of the side insert may be of any color or design. Side inserts must be the same width for all team jerseys. 4" (2" on each side of seam)



OFFICIAL NFHS FIELD HOCKEY SIGNALS



1. Free Hit and 25-Yard Free Hit – Arm held to the side, slightly above horizontal with the palm forward toward the field.

2. **16-Yard Hit** – Umpire's back is to the end line with arms held to the side, slightly above horizontal, palms forward, pointing towards the center of the field.

3. Penalty Corner – Extend both arms horizontally toward the goal.

4. **Penalty Stroke** – First signal time-out (arms crossed at the wrist above the head), then extend the right arm overhead and the left arm toward the penalty stroke line.

5. **Side-In** – For direction, arm extended to the side, slightly above horizontal, palm forward toward the field with other arm down at the side.

6. **Stick Interference** – Hit forearm of one arm with other hand (chopping action).

7. Advancing – Slightly raise one leg and touch it with the hand.

8. Dangerous Use of $\operatorname{Stick}-\operatorname{Raise}$ bent arm forward and upward over the head.

9. Obstruction - Arms crossed in front of chest with palms inward.

10. Third Party Obstruction – Arms crossed in front of chest, palms inward, then move forearms in and out one time.

11. Dangerous Play – Place one forearm diagonally across the chest.

12. $\ensuremath{\text{Time-out}}$ – Arms extended overhead, crossed at the wrist, palms forward towards the field.

13. **Goal Scored** – One arm extended overhead, palm forward, then turn and extend both arms horizontally towards the center of the field.

14. $\ensuremath{\textbf{Bully}}$ – Move hands alternately up and down in front of body with palms facing each other.

15. Advantage – Extend an arm high from the shoulder in the direction in which the benefiting team is playing.

16. Raised Ball – Arms extended in front of body approximately 18 inches apart, with palms held facing each other.

17. No Goal – Extend and cross arms in front of body with palms down.


18. Wrong Side of Stick – One arm extended in front of body, touch back of hand with palm of free hand.

19. Pushing – Hands out in front of body with a pushing motion.

20. **5-Yard Distance** – Extend one arm straight up in the air showing an open hand with all fingers extended.








1. PROPERLY MARKED PROTECTIVE EYEWEAR

With the ASTM standards 2713-09, 2713-14 being in place since 2009 and 2014, respectively, the standardization of the performance of protective eyewear is more important now than ever before. It is incumbent upon the coaches and players to use the properly marked protective eyewear as it was manufactured. Combining various protective devices is potentially harmful and immediately voids any manufacturer's warranty. By rule, required equipment shall not be modified and shall be worn as intended by the manufacturer. Manufacturers spend hundreds of hours researching and testing products before they are released to the public. They ensure that their products will perform at the highest level possible if it is worn properly. The NFHS makes a significant investment in time and resources to identify appropriate equipment for field hockey, for the sole purpose of minimizing risk. That is why there is a new rule requiring that all protective eyewear that meets the current ASTM standard be permanently labeled

effective January 1, 2019.






2. ELIMINATION OF FACEMASK USE AS A PROTECTIVE DEVICE

The masks do not meet any safety standard for ball or stick impact, nor do they offer any shatter resistance

3. 25-YARD FREE HIT

The 25-yard free hit is a new rule change previously handled as a long hit. In an effort to improve the flow of play and standard of the game this rule has been implemented with emphasis on:

- Any 25-yard hit must follow the rules as outlined for any free hit within the 25-yard line.
- It is similar to taking a 16-yard hit, however, the attack has possession and places the ball on the 25-yard line, in line with where the ball went over the end line.
- All players shall be 5 yards away from the ball when the ball is put into play.



4. SELF-PASS AND DELAY OF GAME


The self-pass has been incorporated to improve the flow of the game. Delaying the game by any player should be avoided and coaches/officials should reinforce the following:

• Coaches should provide specific instruction regarding the 5-yard rule and how to defend it appropriately without inhibiting the flow of the game.

• Umpires should establish and communicate the 5-yard standard early in the game to support proper play and conduct of the players.

 A defender influencing or interfering with the self-pass before adhering to the 5-yard rule is a delay of game and should be
 Iized with the appropriate card progression to manage the game.






5. ROUGH AND DANGEROUS PLAY

Overly aggressive play and lack of regard for everyone's safety is unacceptable in the sport of field hockey. In both practice and game play, coaches need to teach the safe use of the stick and good body control. Rough and dangerous play, such as deliberately/blindly hitting the ball into players who have been properly instructed and in good position to play defense, should be addressed by both coaches and officials. Players need to accept the possibility they could inflict serious injury. Officials must be able to recognize dangerous play and penalize it appropriately. Although it is recognized that the possibility

of injury is inherent in field hockey, all participants have the



obligation to minimize risk whenever possible.



6. GOOD SPORTING BEHAVIOR

Officials and coaches need to work together. Each contest is another opportunity for coaches and officials to teach not only field hockey, but also model good sporting behavior. The positive values that are learned will serve the players long after their field hockey experience has concluded. Game situations typically provide a coach the opportunity to identify a teachable moment to reinforce good sporting behavior.
